

CLUB HOUSE LIVE GETS A BOOST

Mono County Probation to fund new technology, programming and additiona staffing for 2017-2018 By Giles

n Thursday, April 6, Mono County Behavioral Health and Mono County Probation Department will host a grand opening of the new and improved Clubhouse Live space at the Sierra Center Mall.

When Clubhouse Live was founded in 2012, the program's goals focused on providing a drug, substance, and bullying-free safe space for local youth to organize events and spend time after school. The program is funded by Proposition 63, also known as the Mental Health Services Act, which was passed in 2004.

In 2014, Mono County Probation Department was awarded a four-year Racial and Ethnic Disparities Grant by the State of California for \$150,000 a year. From 2014-2015, those funds were used to collect data about racial and ethnic disparities in Mono County's juvenile justice system. According to Stacie Casabian, Racial and Ethnic Disparities Coordinator for Mono County, the Probation Office determined that Mono County could do a better job of diverting youth of all backgrounds at the beginning stages of entering the Criminal Justice System.

'We decided to partner with ... Club House Live, and expand the program to better meet the needs of Mono County's youth population, as well as the probation diversion group."

The RED funds from 2016-2017 will fund the Probation Office's collaboration with Club House Live through 2018.

Mono county Deputy Probation Officer Jazmin Puga-Sosa said the goal of the program is to keep kids who might go on probation for minor offenses out of the justice system, and divert them to Club House Live. "Say, for example, a kid had contact with law enforcement because they vandalized. Before, we would place them on probation and have an officer deal with them. Where previously they might have been unsupervised after school, now, they get to interact with their peers and community members in a pro-social environment. We are hoping that will reduce recidivism," said Casabian.

Puga-Sosa said that juveniles are most likely to commit a crime between 3 and 7 p.m., when many adolescents are unsupervised between school and when their parents get off work.

According to Club House Live Co-

ordinator Sal Montanez, there are still very few after school childcare options available to Mono County residents. Montanez says the Club House Live program has about 12 regular attendees during the school year. These kids are students at Mammoth Middle School and Mammoth High School, and they come by to do homework, hang out. During the summer, the program doesn't run every day, but does organize regular outings and activities. Montanez said it is not uncommon for 30 or more kids to show up for those free activities. This summer, Mono County Probation Officers will work as program staff two days a week, which Montanez says will allow the existing three staff to expand program offer-


Montanez says he's excited to see the space expand. "We've been able to buy

art supplies, laptop computers, iPads, a gaming console, and a television. We now have funding to provide after school snacks for these kids. They can come directly from school and stay as late as 6 p.m. And then, if they can't get transportation home, we can offer them a ride." Montanez added that the program plans to expand and facilitate socials between Mammoth Lakes participants and youth groups in Benton and Northern Mono County.

Club House Live is a free afterschool program open to all Mono County youth, ages 12-18. Certain activities require permission slips from parents, but kids don't need a referral from a teacher or probation officer to attend.

Montanez said he hopes the new resources and staff will make Club House Live a safe, even more attractive space for kids to come and hang out ... We are a small community, and that's one of our strengths. We have eyes and ears everywhere, and we've got to look out for our youth."

The Open House will run from 3-6 p.m. in the Club House Live space on the second floor of the Sierra Center Mall in Mammoth Lakes. Staff will be available to answer questions about programming and upcoming events. Revitalization

In 2016, the Behavioral Health Advisory Board (BHAB) experienced a revitalization. The Board appointed several new members, reexamined the bylaws, and composed a new mission statement. Davison House



Davison House is a county-owned residence that the Behavioral Health Department plans to re-open as a permanent supportive housing facility by September, 2018. The BHAB has advised the Director on steps for building political will and has helped developed plans for community outreach.

Partnership & Information-Sharing

The BHAB's diverse membership allows members to share information across agencies. The BHAB is comprised of agency representatives who have common interests, but don't necessarily regularly communicate. BHAB meetings provide an avenue for identifying areas of collaboration.



Next Steps: 2017



As it grows and develops, the BHAB plans to have a more active year in 2017, including the appointment of new members, oversight of the 2017-2020 Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) Three-Year Plan (see attached infographic for further detail), reviews of key performance outcome data, and the completion of the data notebook for the State Mental Health Planning Council. The BHAB will be discussing a 2017 work plan at its upcoming meeting.

Community Development Department

Collaborative Planning Team – The CPT's quarterly meeting of federal, state and local agency directors focused on status of Reds Meadow Road rehabilitation project, California Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, and Regional Housing Study and Action Plan. At the agency roundtable, team members outlined upcoming planning projects in their jurisdictions.



June Lake Citizens Advisory Committee – Short-Term Rental Subcommittee meetings led by *Wendy Sugimura* preceding the CAC sessions have considered neighborhood maps, an outreach calendar, and a widely distributed mailer about upcoming meetings as June Lake addresses concerns over the controversial topic of nightly rentals. Owner-occupied rentals (Type I) require a use permit. Non-owner-occupied (Type II) short-term rentals are under BOS-enacted emergency moratorium for more public outreach. After meeting first Tuesdays for years, the CAC now meets the first Wednesday of each month.

Planning Commission – During a Special Meeting April 20 at Mammoth Lakes the Planning Commission considered four use permit applications presented by **Paul McFarland:** The Mono Lake House B&B along Mono Lake, June Lake Brewery's conversion of parking spaces to summer outdoor seating and added summer parking in winter snow-storage areas, and telecommunication connections to Digital 395 at Crowley Lake and Lee Vining. After four hours of deliberation, all four proposals were approved.

Local Transportation Commission – A grant application for rehabilitating the seriously deteriorated Reds Meadow Road pursued by the Town of Mammoth Lakes and USFS was reviewed. Caltrans provided updates on seasonal pass openings. A public hearing on unmet transit needs will continue at the May 8 meeting.



Mono Basin RPAC – *Michael Draper* conducted outreach and discussion of legal marijuana. *Jill Batchelder* of Eastern Sierra Transit Authority discussed unmet transit needs in the Mono Basin area. *Alex Aguilar* of Southern California Edison provided an update on Edison infrastructure improvements, and *Paul McFarland* updated planning activities in the Basin.

Bridgeport Valley RPAC – At the request of *Supervisor Peters*, the RPAC has been considering meeting second Tuesdays instead of third Thursdays. The RPAC drafted a letter of support for a new CHP office in Bridgeport. A Main Street banner and gun range hours also were discussed. As part of public outreach *Michael Draper* discussed County marijuana policies and regulations.

Land Development Technical Advisory Committee – The LDTAC, comprised of Environmental Health, Public Works, and Building/Planning/Compliance, provides technical review of potential development projects in the county. Recent proposals have included lot mergers, lot-line adjustments, and conditional use permits for short-term rentals at Crowley Lake, Lee Vining and Bridgeport.

Long Valley RPAC – Possible trail connections were considered, as were bear-proof trash enclosures. **Michael Draper** gave a presentation on cannabis regulation with discussion following. **Supervisor Stump** presented a supervisor's report, mentioning the new County ordinance allowing Type I (owner-occupied) short-term rentals. Additional work and outreach is being conducted to regulate Type II (non-owner-occupied) rentals.

FILM COMMISSION:


Here are a couple of screen shots from a recent Jeep Cherokee commercial filmed in February at Arcularius Ranch/Owens

OLD MARINA, MONO LAKE, MONO COUNTY

Mono Lake's calcium carbonate tufa rock formations form small islands here, providing an exotic backdrop. The lake is normally windless and quiet in this location in the winter months, often enabling spectacular reflections all day long. The "belt of Venus" pink-over-blue effect shown in this photo is caused by sunset light over the rising shadow of the earth and Sierra Nevada. It appears very reliably here, about 10-20 minutes after sunset on relatively clear evenings. Numerous commercials, feature films, documentaries, music videos and television series have shot at Mono Lake, from High Plains Drifter (1973) to Pink Floyd's Wish You Were Here album (1975): and a recent television episode featuring adventurer Bear Grylls filmed here. 


